Greg has served as the Senior Project Architect for the Bloch Building addition and other campus enhancement projects at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, the Kauffman Center for the Performing Arts, the Henry W. Bloch Executive Hall at UMKC, the Lewis Center for the Arts at Princeton University, an expansion to the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and the new School of Music Building at the University of Missouri.

The general technical expertise Greg has accumulated through these and other projects is highly respected and sought after. His particular expertise in complex, high performance, façade and glazing system has made him a practice leader for BNIM's integrated design process. In 2006, Greg was recognized as Architect of the Year by the American Institute of Architects Kansas City chapter, and in 2013, he was elevated to the American Institute of Architects College of Fellows.
